## **Gospel Reading** **Mark 13.24-end**

Jesus said to his disciples:

<sup>24</sup>In those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, <sup>25</sup>and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. <sup>26</sup>Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great power and glory. <sup>27</sup>Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

<sup>28</sup>From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. <sup>29</sup>So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. <sup>30</sup>Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. <sup>31</sup>Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

<sup>32</sup>But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. <sup>33</sup>Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. <sup>34</sup>It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. <sup>35</sup>Therefore, keep awake – for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, <sup>36</sup>or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. <sup>37</sup>And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

## **Sermon**

Advent – the start of the church's year and the time to start the countdown to Christmas – whatever that may be like this year! If you ask children what Advent is about, they will probably tell you it means chocolate – working their way through a month of daily chocolate treats from their Advent calendars.

But there is so much more to this first season of the church's year. It is a time of new beginnings, a time of expectation and hope, and a time of waiting.

We live in a world where waiting is almost a thing of the past. Communication is immediate, with mobile phones and the internet – no more waiting for the postman to deliver a letter written perhaps a week previously – even longer if coming from abroad. With credit cards and rapid loans, we no longer have to save up for things. If we want it, we can find a way to have it immediately. Even particular foods are available all year round, so we no longer have to wait for the due season to arrive, in order to savour the delights of strawberries, satsumas or even sprouts!

So why bother with this waiting business? What is the purpose of it if we can have instant gratification?

Waiting is not a time for doing nothing. Waiting can be a positive time of preparation for what is to come.

So what is it that we are waiting for in this season of Advent? Firstly, yes, we are awaiting the celebration of Christmas. We are looking back to the birth of Jesus Christ; the arrival of the Messiah, God incarnate, on earth, over 2 thousand years ago. But that is just part of it. The other part is more difficult to comprehend – the second coming (or Parousia, to use the Greek word) – whenever or whatever that will be. We are looking to the past and we are looking to the future.

In our Gospel reading, Jesus tells his closest disciples, what the signs will be when this happening takes place – how they will know when the time has come – a time only known to God. He tells them to *Keep alert* and to *Keep awake*. They are told to be prepared for this future time when they will see *the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory*. They must be actively waiting.

What will actually happen at this Second Coming is much disputed by theologians, with some maintaining that the Second Coming will be on this earth and others that it will be in another realm after death. Whatever it will be, the world as we know it, will be no more. The Second Coming will bring God's plans for the world to completion.

What is clear from Jesus' words to his disciples, is that it does not matter that we do not know when or how Christ will return. What does matter is that we are ready, doing what God has called us to do, being part of anything that helps to establish the Kingdom of God both in our own lives and the lives of others.

We are living through particularly challenging times at the moment. The current lockdown means that we cannot meet together in person to receive the sacrament on this Advent Sunday, but we are a people of hope, waiting patiently for what is to come. Waiting is not a passive thing. It can be a very positive time and Advent can be a time for all of us to wait actively.

Waiting actively does not mean waiting busily. You may well have seen the T shirts that say, *Jesus is coming – look busy!* But it is not a mindless busy-ness that is needed. Too often we can fill our lives with activity for its own sake. By doing this, we do not have to think about what is really important, that is, how God wants us to live - how we can help to bring the world to readiness.

Today's Old Testament reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah is part of a longer poem which is a communal lament. It reveals a mixture of hope and frustration felt by the Jewish community in Jerusalem about 550 years before the birth of Jesus. The community had returned safely from exile, so you might expect them to be rejoicing, but their hope for a return to the life they had had before, was being frustrated by the changes in Jerusalem in their absence, and plans to rebuild the Temple were being thwarted by setbacks. Isaiah felt that the people had turned their backs on God.

A communal lament is perhaps something we have not encountered much. We tend to think more about a personal lament – lamenting our personal failure to live as we should. However, the call for God to come down and be present among the people is a powerful one – *O that you would tear open the heavens and come down*. Although from a very different era, this plea for God to come to us very much fits the Advent theme and particularly this year when many of us are feeling that same mix of hope and frustration in the way we are currently having to live.

The idea of a communal lament is something that could give us a way to wait actively, this Advent. Rather than just reflecting on our own failings, perhaps we could reflect on how we, as communities, have gone wrong or failed to live up to the standards that God wants of us – as a local community, as a country, as a world.

We can say sorry for our failings and wrong-doings, but then what? In this morning's collect, we ask God to:

*give us grace to cast away the works of darkness*

*and to put on the armour of light*

In this season of Advent, we look for the coming of the Light of Christ into the world. We will be hearing a lot over the coming weeks about that light, of candle flames shining into the darkness

and dispelling it, sending light into the darkest corners. We must be that small flame in our communities and in the world.

Often, we can feel that we cannot do anything that will bring any sort of change in the world around us, let alone the world as a whole, but we should not let that stop us living our lives in a way that shows we are people full of love and hope. Something as simple as smiling and saying hello to the people we meet on our daily exercise; helping and supporting those in need; being positive when we talk to others, even in the present circumstances, showing that we are people of hope. What might seem like insignificant actions can, like a tiny candle flame, make a huge difference in the darkness of the lives of those we meet. We must show in our own lives that we know Jesus and his teachings and help others to know them too.

As we move forward into the new church year, let us all ensure that this season of Advent is a time for hope and active waiting and I want to end by sharing with you the Post-Communion prayer for Advent Sunday:

*O Lord our God, make us watchful and keep us faithful  
as we await the coming of your Son our Lord;  
that, when he shall appear, he may not find us sleeping in sin  
but active in his service and joyful in his praise;  
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen*
