Reflection for March

We are pilgrims on a journey ...

As I write (and thinking HOW does this moment come round so fast?), I am in the throes of preparing to put down my role in ministry in the United Benefice and look forward to retirement. This, in itself, is a real mixed bag of things to do, feelings, and emotions, tidying up and throwing out! The sacred and the secular! Looking back, and looking forwards! What will I forget to tell people? Where has the time gone? What amazing things God leads us into! Is it really Lent again? Where am I going now?

They say that variety is the spice of life, and the journey in the UB has certainly had that in spades. There are things I will never forget – the first Christingle with Deb Dyson pre new heating and being frozen to the 'radiator', and then thoroughly warmed by the wonderful sight of SO many people in church celebrating Christ's incarnation as Light of the World. Baptisms of St. Michael's School pupils in School Worship; baptisms where it suddenly becomes apparent that the Holy Spirit is moving and sometimes unlikely folk are touched by God's grace and presence; baptisms where the baby *almost* escapes into the font in their shiny, slippery, beautiful christening gown! Weddings where love is shared deeply, and vows are exchanged with real meaning; and the one where the groom knelt down and apparently had 'Help me' on the soles of his shoes sense of humour bypass for me on that occasion! The privilege of conducting funerals for strangers who became less so, for family, for church friends. I have always loved the pastoral offices, for better for worse, all part of our pilgrimage from cradle to grave.

There are many 'things' that have been done, sometimes holy, sometimes funny, sometimes joyful, sometimes sad, sometimes all of these by turn, a bit like a Stephen Spielberg film (think ET!). Above all, it is God's people that I love to be with. And that is very much how it has felt in the UB, being *with* people as we seek to discover God's will for us and together move as pilgrims on that journey. It has been fantastic to share that with such a diverse and gifted ministry team, past and present, and to learn from and with them. Equally, it has been fantastic to share with such diverse and gifted people of the congregations and beyond. One of my favourite thoughts about the Trinity, given to me long ago, is that in the Trinity there is no hierarchy – Father, Son and Holy Spirit move together and apart in a holy dance of community and mutual love, each with their own contribution to the life of God, and inviting us to join in and form such community. The UB isn't perfect, but there is something of that mutual learning, caring and sharing that has been, and is, lovely to be part of.

Pilgrimage is a journey with a purpose of moving nearer to God, to a holy place. Personnel and congregations change, and this journey still goes on. During this time of Lent we ponder and study what it means to be an 'Inclusive church' – how we might move from being very welcoming churches to being positively inclusive to all God's people with their spectrum of disability, sexuality, ethnicity and mental health and wellbeing. In our current society where division and fracture and the labelling of 'other' has grown, what might be our role in bringing healing and wholeness and community? There's always a challenge to explore on the pilgrimage! We move nearer to God, that we might live better for others in God's world.

It truly has been a privilege to walk with you all on this journey, on this pilgrimage. I will miss you all, you lovely people! May the road rise beneath your feet

Farewell to Linda

Most of you now know that Linda Collins, our Associate Minister, will be retiring at the end of March. Her last service at St Michael's will be on Sunday 24th March, followed by a bring and share lunch, and we hope as many people as possible will come.



Linda joined the Ministry Team in June 2010, and it was clear from the start that she brought some special gifts to the United Benefice. In January 2012, the Rector, the Revd. David Beedon left and we began a very difficult interregnum which lasted for 18 months. It was during this time that Jon Irons and myself, as the Churchwardens, developed a close working relationship with Linda and really got to know her as a person. She agreed to work full time, and took on the duties of running the Ministry Team, and the day to day life of the church. Her excellent organisational and leadership skills came to the fore.

During this time of uncertainty, members of the congregation were adamant that whatever happened they did not want to lose Linda. In a relatively short time she had become well liked, respected and needed. It was during this time I discovered that Linda has a wicked sense of humour, which certainly kept me sane at the more difficult moments. As you know we ended the interregnum in a slightly unusual way, the Venerable Simon Baker was appointed as part time Rector to the United Benefice and also took on the role of Archdeacon of Lichfield. Linda returned to a part time post but I think it is fair to say that she has played a major part in the day to day running of the church.

Linda leaves us an excellent legacy to continue and build on. I think one of her finest achievements was the setting up of Messy Church, which has had a steady membership since it began. Her teaching skills have been evident both at Messy Church and Family Praise Services where she engaged with the children with a sense of fun but taught them the message of the Bible. Linda also set up the Film Club, which has proved to be hugely popular with church members and people of the wider community. She helped to set up the Memory Café, held in the Methodist Church, at which some of our congregation are volunteers. Outreach has been one her strengths and interests.

I know from my own experience that Linda has given a lot of support to people experiencing personal problems and difficulties. She provided a lot of pastoral support by visiting people in their own homes, hospitals and care homes. She has conducted funerals with dignity and compassion, making them very special and personal for the bereaved families.

We will miss you Linda, you have been a faithful and hardworking member of the Ministry Team and served us well. We hope you have enjoyed your time with us; you leave as a much loved and respected friend. Enjoy your year out, have lots of fun, and good luck with whatever you plan to do in your retirement.

Perpetua, Felicity and their companions. Martyrs, 203

7th March



Perpetua was a young, married noble woman and Felicity was her slave. They were African saints and through their faith they encouraged the very early church. Both were learning about the Christian faith when they were arrested by the Roman authorities, Felicity was pregnant at the time.

The Roman authorities condemned them to death for being Christians (they were baptised when in prison) and were sent to the Arena to be killed as part of the Roman games with crowds of people looking on.

But they didn't die after the animals attacked them and so they were then killed by the sword, before this the two women and the other Christians friends with them share the kiss of peace and affirmed their faith in Jesus Christ.

The story of the how they gave their lives for their faith was shared among the Christian communities who were encouraged by the story. They died on this day in the year 203. They are the patron saints of mothers and children.

This story is over 1,800 years old and it can seem from a different time when law and justice was not as good as it is now, but we need to remember that there are Christians all over the world being killed for their faith in Jesus everyday. Nigeria and Syria being very dangerous places at the moment and there is a great risk of the Christian faith being removed from the Middle East altogether as a result of terrorists. February Film Review of "The Book Club"



The film is about four female friends who formed a monthly book club some 30 years ago, perhaps "The Wine Club" as a name would have be more apt!!

The friends are Candice Bergen, Sharon a Federal Judge still working her way through her decades old divorce, Jane Fonda, Vivian, a selfmade hotel owner, who enjoys her men with no strings attached, Diana Keaton, Diane recently widowed after 40 years of marriage and Mary Steenburgen, Carol whose marriage is a slump after 35yrs and a recently retired husband.

The film tells story in an often hilarious, outrageous and explicit sexual way of how all their lives are turned upside down as a result of reading the '50 Shades of Grey' book series.

The film tells how they individually re find love, by accident on an aeroplane, by internet dating, or by rekindling of an old love affair or just taking hubby to a dancing class.

As a review written at the time describes, the underlying theme is that you don't need anyone's permission to be happy, but some people have problems with the idea women who are old enough to be mothers and grandmothers can be both sexually attractive, as well as attracted to the opposite sex, as it makes them uncomfortable.

I quite enjoyed this film, the sexual content and language could have offended some, however the laughter proved that the majority of the audience were very broad minded.

This was a woman's film, however there were plenty of men present, I would have been very interested to read a review written by one of them.

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The Feast of the Annunciation – also known as Lady Day – has a special place in Mothers' Union history

Lady Day

'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus.'

'I am the Lord's servant,' Mary answered. 'May it be to be to me as you have said.'

Luke 1: 30-31, 38

I wonder how many of us are aware that Mothers' Union observance of Lady Day is actually part of our constitution? (as a recommendation rather than an edict!) In fact, Lady Day has been a significant day for Mothers' Union since 1897.

The updating of our Mothers' Union Constitution, making it fit for 21st century purpose, has kept in full the statement in no.13 of the Regulations made under the Bye-Laws. This says that the Feast of the Annunciation may be observed annually as a special day of prayer and thanksgiving for Mothers' Union.

Although the idea to celebrate Lady Day was first suggested to Mothers' Union in 1895 at the Annual Committee of Presidents and agreed to by Central Council in 1897, it took some time to be adopted across the membership. At a Central Council meeting in 1902, the President of the Diocese of St David's plaintively asked how to surmount the difficulty of obtaining due observance of the day. In the same year however, it was reported that the day was celebrated as far afield as Armagh, Antananarivo and Sydney. In the 1909 annual report it was declared that in the past year the Feast of the Annunciation had almost universally been recognised as a great day of intercession and thanksgiving. Of equal significance was that 'many bishops' had held special services in their cathedrals to mark the day.

Fast forward to today and we find that across the 84 countries where Mothers' Union is represented, Lady Day is celebrated in many and varied ways. Thanksgiving services are widely held and often include the enrolment of new members. Creative ways of celebrating might involve drama and games – as in West Ankole, Uganda, whilst events for Lady Day in Mandalay in Myanmar have included a quiz about Mary and a competition about the Mothers' Union prayer. The Diocese of Southwell & Nottingham have held contemporary Lady Day celebrations during which wonderful prayer activities were enjoyed by children and adults together (some of which included chocolate – a sure winner!)

Ways in which Mothers' Union relates to the story of the Annunciation:

- **Family life** we look to provide Christian care for families worldwide and this includes initiatives to support the role of parents and carers. We deliver parenting programmes, development, policy and faith work that empower women and men in their parenting and life in general. Our emphasis on faith in the family encourages families to experience together the love of Christ; the One whose coming is heralded on Lady Day.
- **Faith** through our fellowship together and our faith and worship resources we nurture our relationship with God, we cultivate our

prayer life and strengthen our willingness to follow our Lord, just as Mary was willing to obey his call.

- **Vocation and service** the annunciation was about listening and responding to God; the result of which has had consequences for all, in every aspect of life. As Mothers' Union we seek to care for people's physical, social and spiritual needs. At this time, we are particularly seeking to listen to God through our global listening process: MULOA, through which we seek to respond to his plans for our service going forward, as we continue to reach out as Christ's hands across the world.
- **Vision** Mary's faith and obedience affected all generations around the world. The faith and obedience of our founder, Mary Sumner, has led to Mothers' Union sharing the love if God's son, Jesus Christ for generations, throughout the world. We pray that in our day, we too, will be willing to follow God in obedience and faith, with thanksgiving and praise and that our souls will always magnify the Lord.

O Lord Jesus Christ give us, we pray, the graces of Mary; faith, patience ready obedience, thankfulness and courage. **Amen**

Mothers Union Report for March 2019 Magazine

At our A.G.M. at the end of January Elizabeth gave a resume of the past year's activities. We had enjoyed a variety of speakers and services, successfully catered for a Lent lunch despite the bitter weather and moved "home" from the hall to the church. She thanked her committee for their unstinting support and presented flowers to Caroline who had relinquished her secretarial duties. Last, but definitely not least, she expressed our appreciation to Lesley who prepares and leads our services at every meeting.

In February we welcomed Helen Palfrey, MU Archdeaconry leader who gave us an illustrated talk about a visit to the diocese of Matlosane in South Africa which is twinned with Lichfield diocese. She had been invited by Bishop Michael to join his group which aimed to strengthen links and meet members of several churches and organisations which worked to improve the welfare of a mainly poor population. They were based about 2 hours drive south of Johannesburg. Here , as in other parts of S.A. the Mothers Union is strong with members wearing uniforms and working hard in their communities.

Everywhere the group was received with great hospitality. They attended many services including the dedication of an Anglican church which had previously been a Dutch Reform church specifically for "whites only" and visited a new cathedral. Some services could last up to 3 hours with people spontaneously bursting into praise or urging the congregation to donate a little more.

Sadly, throughout the diocese they observed great contrasts in life style. Gated communities and guard dogs protect the wealthy while the majority are in shanty towns. There is not enough employment and numbers are swollen by immigrants from Zimbabwe hoping for a better life. Schooling is available but unless the parents can afford to buy them shoes the children cannot attend. They visited a residential centre for treating drug addicts and a hospice whose staff treat 500 patients in their own homes as they have not the facilities for in-patients. Instead they train the patients' families and neighbours to care for them.

In Johannesburg they visited the Apartheid Museum and in Soweto were shown houses where Nelson Mandela and Desmond Tutu had lived. It was a busy visit and Helen's account gave us plenty to discuss.

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Lichfield: Saint Michael and St Mary.

There's a grand title for you! But this is the official name for the group of people who sit on the PCC to help make decisions about the way the church is run; organised; what projects it takes on; how these are supported and how financing of these things is maintained. I am one of those people!

At the last meeting of 2018 it was decided that, during 2019, a summary of the meetings would be made for inclusion in the Parish Magazine. Hopefully this will keep those, who may only have contact with Church via that medium, in touch with items being discussed and decisions made. Some information is issued via the weekly Sunday Pew Sheets. The draft minutes of each meeting are available on the "Church Notices" board at the back of Church and on the website (choose "Our PCC" at the bottom of the list on the left-hand side of the Home Page – click on St Michael's and the meeting dates and minutes are listed).

Tuesday 12/02/19 was the first meeting of 2019. The agenda followed the usual pattern – Opening Prayer; Apologies; Minutes of Last Meeting; Matters Arising from those Minutes; Ministry; Mission; Resources and a new item – New building on Church site!

The old Church Hall's sale packs are nearly ready for prospective buyers to view and the sale will be advertised, asking for offers in excess of £475,000. Questions for consideration on a new building were gathered and will be re-visited and shared with the congregation in due course for comment and input. Decisions made by the PCC on the night were -

- Final design of the Interpretation Board for the Churchyard was agreed and permission is now to be obtained for installation.
- Elizabeth Allen's request to plant a Rowan Tree in the Churchyard in memory of her husband, Ray, was agreed.
- Outreach to Streethay new development will continue with the distribution of cards hi-lighting Mothering Sunday, Palm Sunday and Easter services.
- Plans were accepted for extra parking on the left-hand side of the drive, as you approach the Church, creating 10 Grass and Reinforced Gravel Parking Bays. This will go ahead if the Faculty is granted.
- The Contactless Payment Terminal, which has been in use for Weddings, Funerals and Special Services for a three-month trial, will continue. It's extended use for all services is to be considered by the Ministry Team.

Linda Collins reported back on a meeting she had regarding signing up to be an "Inclusive Church". She will be giving a sermon on 03/03/19 to explain and give information about this, as the community and congregation need to embrace it and get a sense of involvement with the idea. More discussion will be needed and this is just the start of the journey.

Viv Oliver reported on the accounts and it is evident that an increase in income is needed this year. Fundraising needs to be considered together with a reminder about a person's individual weekly giving.

Thankyou for taking the time to read this, I hope it was useful.

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
