Reflection.....

I was driving on the M54 recently – regular users will know that if you are not doing at least 75 in the inside lane you are likely to be causing an obstruction! I became concerned because I noticed that everyone was driving at around 65 in the way that people do in those "average speed check" sections of motorways. I thought maybe there was a new speed camera or a Police car at the front and then realised that people were driving slowly because of the price of fuel...

I happened to be driving at that same speed as part of my intent to be a "better person" – as Joanna Lumley frequently requests of my brother-in-law in the Radio 4 6.30 comedy "Conversations from a long marriage". In this instance my intent is to be aware that I am not a 17 year old boy racer any more. This new challenge comes from reading Richard Rohr's book "The Wisdom Pattern". He says that our goal in life is to be "transformed". I think this means to recognise the behaviours that limit what we are able to become and to set them aside.

Having become a bit of an environmentalist, I am, of course, also concerned to reduce my energy consumption, and particularly the use of fossil fuels. These days it is pretty much impossible to avoid the notion that, as a species, we need to reduce our CO2 emissions or risk permanent damage to the ecosystems of the planet. My experience on the M54 brought home to me how true it is that money and short-term results are more powerful than the promise of long-term benefits.

In 2004, I wrote a kind of environmental version of the Beatitudes for one of Chris' books of liturgical resources — it feels a bit dated now and shows how we have progressed. I was rather gratified to learn that it did become one of the most frequently downloaded items on the Wild

Goose Publisher's website. I sometimes think we may have misunderstood much of Jesus' teaching as recorded in the Gospels. One can read the Beatitudes for example, as a set of strategies for earning celestial "brownie points", and this makes them feel rather heavy. They can alternatively be read as observations that Jesus was making about how our behaviour affects our well-being. Some of the happiest people I have met were at a church in Gugulethu which is basically a shanty-town suburb of Capetown. AIDS was rife there at the time and most of the housing was small breeze-block units, but yet the joy in their singing was out of this world, as was their care for each other.

As we try to cope with the fears about the war in Ukraine, the uncertainty of Covid, and the rapidly rising cost of living we can take pleasure in the small things we all do to care for our planet - God's gift to all living things - and recognise in ourselves the transforming love of our Creator. Enjoy the early Summer – it's a time when hopes are realised in abundance and bright new life is all around.

Up to 500,000 children's storybooks on faithfulness distributed for Platinum Jubilee

Published 04/04/2022

Up to half a million story books will be given to primary school-aged children ahead of Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee by the Church of England and Thy Kingdom Come, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York's global prayer movement.

The book, 'Queen CJ and the Bouncy Castle', is the latest development from the Cheeky Pandas, a children's online cartoon

series created by Swell
Revolution, led by Pete and
Nicola James which has
featured contributions from
people including
Archbishop Justin Welby,
Nicky Gumbel, and
CBeebies' Gemma Hunt
previously.



The free storybook, based on the theme of faithfulness, helps children understand the faithfulness of the God – in honour of Her Majesty the Queen's 70 years of faithful service.

The book's creation and distribution is part of plans for this year's Thy Kingdom Come, a global ecumenical prayer movement initiated by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, which unites Christians in nearly 90% of countries worldwide to pray for evangelisation from Ascension to Pentecost. It is also an official Church of England schools' resource for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Alongside the book, similar in size to Mr Men and Little Miss books, there will be a brand new five-part online TV series of the Cheeky Pandas, based on the Fruit of the Spirit and inspired by the Bible. There are also Platinum Jubilee music videos for toddlers and young children, and a special 'Royal' episode to accompany the story book, created by the makers of CBBC's 'Andy and the Band' and CBeebies' 'The Baby Club', with voiceovers from Gemma Hunt.

Other free resources will include activity packs, assembly plans, TV episodes online and music videos of original songs created especially for the series. These can be used in homes, churches and schools, who are encouraged to order bulk copies of the free book to give out as they choose. They have been generously funded by a range of external funders.

More than a quarter (135,000) of the half a million books have already been ordered.

Nigel Genders, Church of England's Chief Education Officer, said: "We are really excited to be a part of Thy Kingdom Come again this year. "It continues to offer a fantastic opportunity for schools to engage



children and young people in thinking creatively about prayer, faith and offers the opportunity to put this into practice both within school and through serving their local communities."


Pete James, the creator of the Cheeky Pandas said: "It is an honour to partner with Thy Kingdom Come and the Church of England this year to create these resources to nurture young children's faith in a fun way, in celebration of Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. "The new series of online TV cartoons and the book are based on the Fruit of the Spirit from Galatians. With new songs to dance along to, and activity packs to enjoy, we hope these fun resources will help children grow deeper in their faith during this year's Thy Kingdom Come."



Overwhelming - the bad and the good

I wonder what adjective you would choose to describe the experience of living through

recent events? How about 'overwhelming'?

Being overwhelmed is to be caught up, carried along or bowled over, by things over which we have no control. The list from the last couple of years is long and growing: the changes brought by Brexit; the covid pandemic – the invisible virus causing so much illness and death, fear of who might be affected next, and daily living abruptly changed by strict public health restrictions; a fuel shortage causing petrol pumps to run dry; and now rapidly escalating costs of living along with a war much closer to home than any others we have known for many decades. Our own personal circumstances might add a few more to the list.

Although the word 'unprecendented' has rapidly risen up the list of most commonly used words in the last two years, life being overwhelming is not new.

The Bible is full of stories of people being overwhelmed by both bad and good things. Creation is overwhelmingly beautiful; the consequences of Adam and Eve's sin are overwhelmingly devastating. In the story of Noah the world is overwhelmed by evil, then the water of the flood, then the water is overwhelmed by God's mercy and blessing, to name just a couple of examples. The story of Jesus might

be read as a sequence of overwhelmings as he is tempted in the desert, immerses his life in prayer, and transforms the lives of many he meets. The 'success' of Jesus' mission and ministry appears to be crushed by the defeat of the cross.

The good news of Easter though is that the negative overwhelmings don't have the final say. As Jesus willingly goes to the place of ultimate overwhelming and annihilation, the power of death itself is overwhelmed by God's love as Jesus rises again to life.

One theologian, David Ford, suggests that 'coping with multiple overwhelmings' is 'the most important thing in our lives'. Rather than resisting or fighting senses of overwhelming he suggests three steps. Firstly to name them. In the Bible God does not shirk away from naming the sin and evil that is harming the world, or the ways in which His people wander away from Him. Second is to be real and describe or narrate the experience. The book of Job and the Psalms are great examples of this. Then thirdly to 'attend to the shape of living'. Rather than fiddling with the details of bad overwhelmings, or allowing ourselves to drown in them, to shape our lives in ways which allow the truth of God's love, life and hope to dominate. If you took up any form of spiritual practice for Lent and it helped you focus more on Jesus, then why stop them just because you've got to Easter?

My prayer is that as we celebrate Easter we allow ourselves to be overwhelmed again by the reality of Jesus resurrection, and then let the implications of it shape our thinking, our feeling and our living. As John's gospel famously starts: 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' (John 1:5 NIV)

The St. Michael chalice of 1684

A short historical article this month. In "A History of the County of Stafford: Volume 14, Lichfield" we read the following in the section devoted to St. Michael's church in Lichfield.

....a silver-gilt chalice and paten of 1684 were acquired. They were sold (by the Church Wardens) with a pewter flagon and plates in 1852 to a Birmingham firm in part payment for a new set of plate. The chalice and paten of 1684 were bought the same year by St. Clement's, Oxford.

Clearly this was later regretted and we read.

... attempts in 1892 and 1923 to recover them for St. Michael's were unsuccessful.

And there I might have left the matter, perhaps as a sort of parable on the foolishness of Church Wardens*, and the futility of the pursuit of modernity, but for the all-seeing eye of Google. A quick search of "chalice / St Clements / Oxford" let me to "An Inventory of the Historical Monuments in the City of Oxford" from 1929 in which I found the rather poor photograph of the 1684 chalice shown below. It

is rather fuzzy, but I think the motif is clear enough – the winged archangel trampling over the devil at his feet. I can't read the caption, so if any reader can enlighten me on this I would be grateful. The question arises as to where the chalice and its associated paten are now. To find the answer to this would I am afraid take more than a quick Google search. Perhaps one day....

St. Michael's Churchyard Working Party



Now that the tree planting season is over attention turns to **Planting** of Summer Flowering Plants. We have 2 Tower Beds and a Herb Garden. We established the herb garden last year. At this month's Working Party we will be planting perennials and some annual bedding plants in the Tower Beds. In the Herb Garden weeding will need to be done with the possible addition of a few new herbs for this year, although I am pleased to say that most of last year's plants have survived thanks to yet another mild winter.

At their April Meeting the PCC supported my decision to apply for an annual Award given by Lichfield Diocese to Churchyards that meet specific criteria. **The Diocesan Churchyard Award Scheme** is not a competition between Churchyards. It is an award that is given to individual Churchyards based on their achievements in reaching certain criteria. The criteria include Provision of Information, Care of graves and memorials; Provisions to promote wildlife; and Community involvement. Following the receipt of the application, judges will be visiting the Churchyard in the Summer months. There are 4 categories of Award: Highly Commended: Bronze; Silver; and Gold. The result will be given in September or October. At the May Working Party part of our time will be spent simply walking around the Churchyard and considering any work we need to do in readiness for the judges' visits.

The Working Party will be on Saturday May 28th., from 10.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. Refreshments of Tea/Coffee/Cake will be provided. Do please join us if you can.

St. Michael's Churchyard More About Trees.

You may recall that Ron Plimmer took cuttings of the willow tree, known as Johnson's Willow, last Autumn. The tree grew by the side of Stowe Pool but was diseased and replaced by a new descendant of the original Johnson's Willow tree. This new tree was planted in November, 2021. Ron potted up his 5 tree cuttings and I am pleased to report that they are doing well in their individual pots. We hope to plant them in our Churchyard Tree Nursery this Autumn. Ron's photograph shows 1 of the healthy willow seedlings.

At our February Working Party we planted 5 new native tree seedlings and these have settled in their new home near to the Law Monument and are being protected by substantial tree guards.

We had donations of 3 new deciduous trees, 2 beech and a ginkgo, a tree new to the Churchyard. These were planted at the end of March and they, too have taken well to their new surroundings. Many thanks to those who have donated the trees. Your generosity is much appreciated.

I would then grab a handful of crayons and joyfully work to make a bright colourful picture, which would, in my eyes, be a masterpiece. My picture in hand, I would demand everyone's attention; the excitement of receiving many compliments and little rewards was second to none. I can still remember the delightful 'ooohs' and 'aaahs' from my parents and all those around me.

Joining the dots is very important to Mothers' Union work. It not only inspires members to share their passion and stay connected across the globe; it highlights the way a single green patch can be nurtured from small seeds to healthy growth. When joined up with other patches, it becomes part of a sea of living, flourishing fields making a huge difference.

A landscape that was once lacking is transformed into a marvellous place, bearing good fruit for all to benefit. It is the collective acts of love driven by our courageous and determined members that transform churches and communities to reflect the love of Christ and his Kingdom. Every little bit counts, creating the kind of transformation that alters the course of history.

Inspired, other members started growing vegetables in their gardens too. They then started growing different vegetables, so they could share with each other. A surplus of vegetables one year resulted in providing hot meals for primary school children. This led to the establishment of a market, where the vegetables could be sold to nearby villages, providing an income for the families and food for the communities. *To God be the glory, great things he has done* ... became their theme song.

A changing world can feel overwhelming. However, with Christ at the centre and our eyes focused together on the goal ahead, with faith as small as a mustard seed and determination to overcome challenges, growth from tiny seeds results in a huge harvest of miracles. These create a ripple effect of change, transforming our churches and communities to reflect Christ's Kingdom.

Advance notice was also given of the 6.30am Easter Day Vigil and breakfast service much the same as our own Easter Morning. dawn service introduced by the "last Rector" Simon Baker shortly after joining us at St. Michaels.


