Last term was the first time since March 2020 that school life felt as if it had returned to normal. During the year we had increasingly managed to re-establish our performances, face to face meetings and PTA events. At times the biggest challenge was remembering how we used to do things! The first school disco certainly caught us unawares – but the children had a great time and parents were very forgiving of the long queues to get in. However, it was the Summer Term where

we had a full range of extra-curricular activities back on offer and successes such as our teams participating in all three County cricket finals.

However, as I've looked back and reflected on the past year, one of the greatest gifts to us as a school has been the arrival of Abbie as our new Rector. Abbie has been a great enabler in the past twelve months. We have always been proud of the strong links between our school and St Michael's Church and in this post Covid era we are so grateful for the passion, commitment and creativity that has galvanized both church members and school staff to promote the 'Growing Faith' agenda. From film shows with lunches, to uniform exchanges with craft activities, photography competitions, churchyard trails and homework club, St Michael's Church community has opened its doors and provided a place of welcome. Conversations with children at school and their parents demonstrate that people feel a part of the wider St Michael's community. They may not be in church on a Sunday, but they feel they belong – and that's a fantastic achievement. Thank-you to each and everyone of you who has given time to make this happen. It's valued beyond St Michael's School too.

Through the myriad of opportunities provided for our children to connect with St Michael's, we've seen 6 children baptised, 22 make communion before confirmation and welcomed Bishop Michael to confirm 9 children. It's been wonderful to see the Junior Choir grow over the past year with pupils loving the opportunity to sing regularly in Church Services. Our Year 5 children led inspiring workshops for children across the school for Thy Kingdom Come; to see their confidence and conviction as they explained about and provided opportunities for the rest of the school to respond to different types of

prayer was very moving. It has been lovely, once again, for our Year 2 children to be involved in creating flower arrangements for Harvest and our Year 3 children to create Christingles. These small contributions enable our children to feel that they belong.

The Church of England Vision for Education defines a thriving church school as one which enables all of its children to flourish and to live life in all its fullness. As children move on to the next stage in their education they should have hope and aspiration; have a sense of belonging and understanding of community, and be able to live well together; they should demonstrate dignity and respect; and have the appropriate wisdom, knowledge and skills to succeed. At the heart of this they should also understand the riches of Christianity underpinned by their knowledge of Jesus and the Church.

It is an absolute privilege to be the Headteacher at St Michael's School where this is truly possible. Without the support that you all provide, we wouldn't be able to do what we do. If you've not been involved to date, and would like to do so, please do get in touch. Abbie has been promoting the Pray – Bake – Read strategy in recent weeks. Please do consider helping us. If you can't commit on a regular basis, but are nifty at threading needles, we'd love your occasional help when the children are sewing.

This coming year sees new ventures for us. With Abbie's support we're aiming to start a discipleship group for those children who have made their communion before confirmation and who have been confirmed. We've registered for the Eco Schools programme and are looking to combine the two so that courageous advocacy is at the heart of our discipleship. Andrew Jones, our Assistant Head, is going

to be training some new pupil worship leaders and Sarah Brooks will be continuing to develop our Dementia Friendly School initiative. Another joy this year are the links Sarah has re-established with the Memory Café at the Methodist Church. There are exciting times ahead.

As we begin a new school year, the legacy and spirit of Alison Staines, a former Foundation (Church) Governor and previous Chair of Governors, will be with us. The epitome of our school values; Alison was such an inspirational, caring, fun-loving and amazing person. Her zest for life and passion for our school were a great support to us as staff. Even after her time as a governor, she retained her interest in what we were doing and encouraged us along the way behind the scenes. Alison's wisdom and insight were second to none. As a staff team our thoughts are with Tony, Alex and Amy at this time; Alison's spirit lives on with those of us who had the pleasure and privilege to work with her at St Michael's.

LIVING IN LOVE AND FAITH

Group to meet ahead of November Synod

07/08/2023

Group reflecting wide range of Church traditions to take part in facilitated Living in Love and Faith conversations ahead of November Synod



A group drawn from across different traditions within the Church will meet next month as part of ongoing work in the Living in Love and Faith process.

Invitations have been issued to join three facilitated conversations in September ahead of consideration at the November Synod of proposals to enable same-sex couples to come to church following a civil marriage or civil partnership for prayers of dedication, thanksgiving and for God's blessing on the two people.

The group, created at the invitation of the Co-Chairs of the Living in Love and Faith Steering Group, Bishop Sarah Mullally and Bishop Philip Mounstephen, will bring a wealth of knowledge from prior involvement in the LLF process, as well as a range of lived experiences. Membership of the group will be published at a later date.

The group will receive an update on the ongoing work on pastoral guidance and pastoral assurance in relation to the Prayers of Love and Faith and will be asked to provide their insights and reflections.

The outcome of the conversations will feed into discussions at meetings in the autumn of the College and House of Bishops ahead of the November Synod.

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, said the creation of the group was part of the next stage of consulting widely following the July Synod.

"The House and the College of Bishops have a real desire to create a loving, generous, ecclesial and pastoral space, despite deeply held differences of opinion, in which we can share our ministry and implement the motion agreed by the Synod in February," she said.

"There is a desire to joyfully offer a pastoral response to loving, faithful and long-term same sex relationships. There is at the same time no intention of changing the doctrine of marriage as expressed in the canons and the authorised liturgy of the Church of England.

"Holding these commitments together is at times painful and complex. As part of this we are seeking to listen to people's hopes and concerns and to ensure that they are satisfied that their views have been taken into consideration."

The new group has been formed after the General Synod received an update earlier last month on the work which has taken place since the <u>landmark debate</u> in February welcoming proposals to enable same-sex couples to come to church following a civil marriage or civil partnership for prayers of dedication, thanksgiving and for God's blessing on the two people. The proposals came out of a six-year period of listening, learning and discernment known as Living in Love and Faith.

Inclusive Church at St Michael's

In our PCC and ministry team meetings we have been talking about whether St Michael's should join the organisation "Inclusive Church". Inclusive Church is a network of Churches, groups and individuals gathered around a shared vision.



Their vision statement is as follows:

"We believe in **inclusive church**— a church which **celebrates** and affirms every person and does not discriminate.

We will continue to challenge the church where it continues to discriminate against people on grounds of disability, economic power, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, learning disability, mental health, neurodiversity, or sexuality.

We believe in a Church which welcomes and serves all people in the name of Jesus Christ; which is scripturally faithful; which seeks to proclaim the Gospel afresh for each generation; and which, in the power of the Holy Spirit, allows all people to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Jesus Christ."

Joining Inclusive Church is a way of proclaiming boldly as a Church that God's love is for everyone. It would also help us to reach out to new members who are looking for a Church where they are sure to be welcomed warmly, whoever they are. You don't have to have a particular view on any issues to be an Inclusive Church (for example, same sex relationships or immigration), just to be committed to welcoming people warmly and without discrimination.

Over the next couple of months at St Michael's we will be working through some of the prickly issues of inclusion and thinking about the ways in which Churches sadly have made some people feel unwelcome in the past, and what we might need to do differently in the future, so that we can decide whether Inclusive Church is for us, and work towards being a community in which everyone is equally valued and celebrated.

THE ELIZABETH LOGAN PARISH CENTRE PROJECT UPDATE

You might not recognise the title of this article – but there is good news that St Michael's PCC met at the end of July to progress the project formerly known as the "parish rooms".

The vision

The first decision was to adopt formally the vision statement for the project, which has been formed over a long period, but has now been fully "landed" in writing, with thanks to Rector Abbie.

The vision is introduced by confirming that once completed, the rooms will be called the "Elizabeth Logan Parish Centre". Elizabeth was a nurse who worked alongside Florence Nightingale in the Crimean War. Not much is known about her after that except that she made her way back home on the Ottawa and died in Lichfield many years later and was buried in St Michael's Churchyard. On her gravestone it says that she had "a strong sense of duty and great kindness of heart. No one who witnessed her self-denying exertions in aid of suffering humanity could ever forget them." Naming our new Parish Centre after Elizabeth reminds us that all we have as a Church is to be used in the service of others, and for the common good. The Parish Centre is an opportunity to live out this calling for the benefit of the community.

The vision statement also confirms that we are looking to use the Parish Centre primarily to enable the Church to serve the community, rather than as rooms for commercial hire. The Parish Centre will facilitate our mission as a Church, currently expressed and lived out through our commitment to film club, homework club, first steps, junior and senior choirs, the churchyard working party and to possible future projects such as bereavement groups and coffee mornings. The Centre will allow the current activities to be delivered in comfortable and suitable surroundings, without the concern of having to heat a largely uninsulated building which is not suitable for general

community activities, allowing us to improve our carbon footprint.

Making progress

PCC also decided that we should embark on the next stage of the project which will involve the architect producing more detailed drawings, plans and specifications for the Centre which will facilitate a planning application and a faculty application. This work will also result in more accurate costings for the project.

Obtaining planning permission is never straightforward, and we will want to consult the wider church community and the local community on the plans for the Parish Centre. As well as this, many other surveys and plans must be submitted demonstrating that the construction and finished project will, as examples, minimise impact on the environment and nature and has a transport plan which will encourage sustainable ways of getting to the Centre.

Once planning is obtained and detailed cost calculations are received, this will enable us to embark on the fundraising phase, because most funders will only award grants once projects are fully costed and can proceed. There is a good prospect of applying for multiple capital grants which are available for new community based facilities. Towards the end of the fundraising phase, estimates will be obtained from suitable local building contractors and construction can commence.

In the meanwhile, we have to do more work on VAT and governance.... the work does not stop...!


husband of a member. Will this result in a serene and well-balanced group? I hope so.



The husband willingly agreed to do an interview (which will definitely need editing as we couldn't stop him once the camera was rolling!!). We had interest from a man wanting to volunteer with us and email contacts were exchanged.

We came across a young man who had got separated from the friends he had come out with and was trying to get back to Birmingham but didn't have money (as it was around £25 he needed we couldn't really help him out - so we prayed he would link up with his friends at some

point). A young homeless man was outside B&M writing copious notes and was surrounded by loads of books and papers... we chatted for a while but became quite aware that he appeared to have some obvious mental health issues... when a team passed him later that night he was asleep in that same doorway- it so sad that we can only inform people like him that there are places they could stay...but it is up to them to want to go to them.

There were a couple of falls by some young men, one of whom chose, for some reason, to do a 'belly flop' onto the slabbed pavement!! The other went over on his back spilling his chicken and chips all over the pavement and possibly giving himself some 'next morning' bruises. A number of people went to help him up but his embarrassment and pride was stronger than our eagerness to help him as he rebuffed all efforts those trying to help him to his feet.

We managed to get our favourite doorman, Bobby, on film bringing us a complimentary box of chips!! He will officially be immortalised as the legend that he is!

Soon it was time to pack up and return to our base. Our heartfelt thanks to Oscar for 'staying the course' as he was a real trouper throughout the evening. We may or may not have a little bit more filming to do before editing but we are looking forward to seeing what he produces. This year we want to support the Macmillan Cancer Charity and we would like to invite anyone who has a couple of hours to spare to join us for the afternoon.


We are a small WI group and would love to have some new members. You don't have to be able to make cakes, knit or sew but we would love you to come along, try us and enjoy our company!
