

Reflections for August

Be Mindful

It's super fashionable and surrounded by hype, there are articles in almost every magazine you pick up but mindfulness has been tried and tested for thousands of years. It was practised by the desert Fathers and Mothers, it is found in the Eastern Orthodox Church and most of us know that the Buddhists are great exponents and that is where the great spiritual writer and monk Thomas Merton found it.

Modern mindfulness if that is what you want to call it is not necessarily a religious practice, psychologists would argue that is more like brain training, and clinical studies have shown that it can help reduce anxiety and chronic pain, boost your immune system, lower blood pressure, tackle insomnia, improve your memory and increase your physical stamina.

Companies like Apple and Google run workshops for their staff and some schools are beginning to teach it and an increasing number of NHS doctors are starting to prescribe mindfulness courses as an alternative to antidepressants.

So, what exactly is mindfulness and what can it bring to our Christian life?

Mindfulness can be described as being more fully aware of your own experience in the present moment in a non-judgemental way.

There are four strands to this definition: awareness, experience, the present moment and non-judgement.

Awareness is offered as an antidote to the automatic way our brains tend to work most of the time, awareness can lead to a greater choice in how we use our mind. Our own experience is intended to counteract the brain's tendency to over analyze. Analysis is an important brain function and many problems can be solved in this way, but not all.

Emphasis on the present moment is also important, in many forms of yoga you are encouraged to think about past experiences, learn from them but not dwell on them, the same for the future, make your plans but come back to the present and appreciate the now.

Having a non-judgemental attitude helps us counter the human tendency to repress those things of which we are ashamed or embarrassed. Learning to forgive, with compassion, is a way to healing, especially forgiving ourselves and accepting forgiveness from others, including and especially God.

That brings me to how mindfulness could help our Christian life.

You are probably thinking of prayer, many of us will have been taught meditative or contemplative prayer, the stilling of the body and mind by focusing on relaxing our muscles, each set are tensed and relaxed beginning at the feet and working to the face and/or breathing techniques, again these are a common feature in yoga.

At my home church, I belonged to a "Circle of Prayer" we gathered and spent 30 minutes in silent prayer, this was not easy at first, we would use "tools" to help us focus, a lighted candle, a key word or phrase, a pebble or shell but often cabbages would disturb our thoughts. What I mean are the everyday thoughts, the washing that needs sorting, the shopping, cutting the lawn. In mindfulness, you need to recognize these thoughts, and bring yourself back to your focus. Eventually we even stopped hearing the bus that came and went during our time together.

Some of these "cabbages" may be much more than the shopping list, and need us to be aware of them; we need to acknowledge them, in that non-judgemental way.

This is where forgiveness comes in, developing an attitude of compassion or kindness, to ourselves and to others.

Mindfulness in the Christian tradition can also be seen in the Gospels, the powerful parable of the Prodigal Son, the "Waking-Up", being fully aware, is a good illustration

"When he came to his senses, he said: "How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death!"

'Being and doing', this is seen in the visit of Jesus to Mary and Martha, so often we make ourselves so busy that we don't make the time to just "BE", to be in the presence of God

"There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part."

Also, Jesus said "Abide in me as I abide in you."

I hope this may have prompted you to look again at your own spiritual practices, you may be happy where you are if not perhaps mindfulness could help you.

None of this comes easily, it does require practice but it can be learned and there are many books and courses to help.

"Be still and know that I am God"

Water tap in the churchyard

People tending graves in the churchyard will have noticed that the tap near the new churchyard is no longer functioning and a new tap provides water where the path meets the drive. This is because when the work on the church toilets and kitchen was carried out, the old lead pipes had to be replaced with modern, safer ones.

If we had replaced the lead piping to the old tap, it would have cost almost £3000 pounds more – money we do not have to spare.

Some people have already said that they would like to donate towards the reinstatement of the old tap, close to the new churchyard as it is more convenient for them.

We drive to The Drill Inn, 33 Springle Styche Lane, Burntwood WS7

9HD, for the start of the first part of the walk.

We shall be completing a short walk from The Drill Inn, going along part of the Heart of England Way which follows the Redmoor Brook for part of



the way. There are 4 stiles in this section of the walk which includes some rough ground and a hill. This section of the walk is $1\,\%$ miles long.

Coffee is at The Drill Inn at 11am where we will also be able to preorder our lunch. If you do not want to do the first part of the walk you could join us at 11am for coffee and the second part of the walk, which is less challenging.

At the end of May we hosted the Deanery Festival of Thanksgiving, celebrating the ways MU live out our faith in action. The service was taken by Rev. Kareen Lowther, making a very welcome return and our ladies' choir was swelled by some members of other MU's. These events are like family gatherings and afterwards, over refreshments we all socialised and caught up with news. This year there was the added attraction of our new kitchen and toilets which were much admired by our visitors.

The following week many of our members joined the new-ish MU at Wiggington for a service led by Rev. Debra Dyson, another of our "old girls". As always refreshments and conversation followed. Wiggington are not in our Deanery but we are building links with them.

Back in the hall in June we were treated to an outstanding talk about Costa Rica from Rev. Denise Youngs who had holidayed there. Assisted by our own cinematographer, Romulus Plimmer, they gave a very professional presentation. For those who knew little about the country it was a revelation. There is good stewardship of natural resources and eco-tourism is encouraged. Health provision and education are well funded and of a high standard. 95% of inhabitants are literate and older residents who missed out on schooling can attend evening classes. Thanks to the generosity of the old coffee barons the city boasts some beautiful public buildings including a theatre which would not look out of place in Italy. Denise visited a gold museum and another displaying the jade which is to be found in the country.

Her party stayed at a number of eco- lodges and were glad to have a guide to point out many things they might have missed. It was amazing how well many animals and birds could camouflage themselves in the lush forests. On the lower slopes of a volcano they

bathed in bubbling mud springs and later in the holiday they went white-water rafting which looked exhilarating or terrifying, according to your point of view.

She gave us a splendid evening and I, for one would happily hear and see it all again.

For our midsummer outing we visited the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas. Blessed with a sunny but fresh day we enjoyed a welcome talk about the origins of the Arboretum followed by a ride around a large section of the site in the land train with a commentary about the memorials and gardens as we passed them. Next came tea in the new reception and eating area. Only those who had visited recently had seen this impressive building. Minutes of St Michael's PCC meeting held on Tuesday 11th July 2017

- **Streethay** 31st July is when welcome packs will be delivered to the new houses in Streethay and packs will be available for any other new residents in the area. The Methodist minister from Fradley will be joining us to do this.
- Mission to new housing areas Simon has been asked by the Bishop to develop a policy on this.
- **Thy Kingdom Come** was a great success. The new Prayer Corner was very well used and it is likely to become a regular event nationally. Next year it is likely that more branches of Christianity will be joining in.
- Patronal Festival Bishop Clive, Bishop of Wolverhampton, will preside and preach on Sunday 24th September. The morning will begin at 10am when we can meet for coffee and a late breakfast, the service will be at 11am and a bring and share lunch after the service.
- **Church roof** the repair work has been finished.
- Office the phone is due to be transferred on the 19th July. The
 Virgin fibreoptic line is now in, which means there is now Wifi in
 the church office. No public access to the wifi will be available.
 PCC agreed a policy that young people in church should not be
 given access to the wifi. The code will not be generally available
 unless requested by an adult for a specific purpose.
- **Toilet blockage** this is because there is not enough 'flush' to clear the system. Crofts have been out to look at the system and

a broken spring was found in the disabled cistern. Please report if any problems are observed. We may need to stop using paper towels but we cannot use blower driers because we do not have enough electrical capacity.

- **First aid** Lyn Sheil will be going on training next week. Sue Jones is already trained. One trained first aider should be available at Lichfield Festival Concerts.
- ICE (in case of emergency) form Lyn is in the process of developing a form for use in St Michael's
- Mission Action Plan this should last 5 years, so this year is not a re-write, just an update. PCC broke into groups to discuss and suggest amendments. These were fed back and the MAP will be updated in light of these suggestions. A number of issues were raised that will be added to the agenda throughout the year. A lot of things have been achieved already.
- **Tuesday Club** attendance has been very variable. Autumn Programme will be historical and cultural talks.
- Ministry Team Rev Dr Stephen Barton has been attending church for approximately 6 months. His ministry has been mainly academic recently and he will be preaching at St Michael's on 27th August when he will be introduced to the congregation. PCC accepted his offer to officiate or preach once a month, starting from the next rota.
- Church Hall no response has been received from the District Council so now a letter will be sent to the Chair of the District Council.

• **Health and Safety** – ambulance service has confirmed that it now has the correct postcode.

Maintenance Ray reported that Nick Burton will deal with the leaning pine tree on Health and Safety grounds. It will be felled on the 17th July. A condition survey of the trees will be completed soon. Payback Team have staffing issues and it is becoming very unreliable. Standing Committee have agreed that Michael Toplis will come in with a team to strim the grass, nettles and brambles. They will also raise the level of some overgrowing trees. There is a grass cutting and maintenance regime is in place for the new churchyard. Churchyard Development Plan - 62 replies to the survey have been received from the congregation and the community. John Polhill and Ray will collate the results of the surveys at the end of July. Harriet Carty, from Caring for God's Acre, is visiting on 2nd August to meet the Churchyard Group and look around the churchyard to give here opinions on what needs to be included in the plan. Some Year 6 pupils have also contributed their ideas. The water tap is no longer working at the lower churchyard. There is some local support from people who would like to sponsor the work to replace this. It was agreed to put a notice asking for pledges and an article in the magazine. Maintenance money for the new churchyard comes from funeral fees and a council grant. The old churchyard is maintained by the council as it has a statutory obligation to maintain the churchyard and keep it safe but not necessarily to a 'parks'

SULLY



The film shown in July was "Sully: Miracle on the Hudson". We are sorry not to be able to carry our normal review by one of our volunteer reviewers. The DVD can be borrowed if you want to view this exciting movie which tells the extraordinary story of the aircraft captain, Sullenberger, (Sully) who tries to make an emergency landing in New York's Hudson River in 2009 saving the lives of 155 passengers and crew. His A324 had only just taken off from New York's La Guardia airport heading for Charlotte, North Carolina, when it hit a flock on geese which severely damaged both engines. While the media seize upon Sully as national hero, he was severely criticised (for putting his passengers'and crews' lives at risk) by the civil aircraft authorities. Much of the film is taken up with the intricacies of the inquiry which followed the incident. The film is directed by Clint Eastwood, with Tom Hanks playing Sully. The point at issue is - when and where is it possible for responsible people to over-ride official instructions and use their own discretion or instinct. Sully had been instructed to return and make an emergency landing on a runway. He claimed that he did not have enough time to do this. It also emerged that he had not had any training to prepare him for an emergency landing on water. In the final analyses should the successful avoidance of a major disaster put the ethical risks, taken against official advice, in the shade? Discuss!

This is probably not a film for anyone with a fear of flying.



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
