


Reflections for September

Guy Elsmore (Archdeacon of Buckingham and formerly General Secretary of Modern Church) wrote a series of three articles asking, "Can liberals embrace the Growth Agenda?" This summary of his second article is a belated follow-up to the summary of his first article in the September 2016 Parish Magazine. This looks at some recent research on church growth and what it may tell us about the ways in which liberal churches might approach the task of seeking growth, reflecting back on some of the liberal strengths identified previously.

An early report *From Anecdote to Evidence* commissioned by the Church Growth Research Programme (CGRP) has been applauded by many as offering reasonably reliable and robust conclusions regarding churches in the UK; and the Faith Communities Report (2010) from the Hartford Institute for Religion Research (HIRR) drew similar conclusions in the USA context.

Growth is not limited by tradition --- liberal churches can grow. The CGRP is clear that church tradition is not a predictor of growth. There are stories to be told of liberal churches around the country that are growing strongly. The HIRR report drew exactly the same conclusion in the USA context.

Churches that have a clear mission tend to grow. Again, both reports show that churches which do not clearly identify their uniqueness are less likely to grow than those which are able to express their identity with focus and clarity. How can liberals present a clear mission statement to the world, when our mission is contingent on an encounter with the world when that encounter might even change us as much as it changes the world? Perhaps the answer is to point clearly to those liberal values (listening, openness, inclusivity, flexibility, humility etc) and being very clear about them. There is a real and creative challenge for liberal churches and PCCs to work on in beginning to articulate this with real clarity. For instance, how

about a strapline like 'St Blog's, the listening church'? There are ways of being clear about liberal identity, and this is a challenge for us all.

Churches that are intentional about growth tend to grow. There are authentic ways of speaking of the growth that God brings to the church, without selling our soul either to the market or to ways of being church that violate our integrity. Another linked finding from HIRR is that while CGRP is correct in that there is no correlation between theological identity and growth, there is a concentration of growing churches at the extreme ends of all theological traditions. ie for liberals, those churches which adopt a very clear 'progressive' agenda are more likely to grow than those at the milder end of liberalism. However Guy's experience suggests that this effect may be more strongly linked to the issue of clear identity rather than the attraction of the extreme. Those at the extreme ends of all traditions automatically have a very clear position. This makes it all the more urgent that those who don't find themselves comfortable on the extreme, become comfortable with the uncomfortable task of being clear about their identity.

Churches whose leaders and congregations adopt change tend to grow. Both CGRP and HIRR have shown that liberal churches are just as likely to grow as other churches. They show that clarity about our mission and purpose is a very important factor in growth, and that naming growth as part of that identity helps the process of growing: so is the capacity of leaders and people to be open to change, and to continue reflecting on experience such that change becomes part of their continuing life together.

Another linked finding is that churches which innovate, creating new opportunities for people to join through Fresh Expressions, will tend to grow. Examples of liberal Fresh Expressions include groups offering experimental spirituality, Christian approaches to mindfulness, LGBTI worship communities and many more. Alongside innovation is also the sharing of leadership beyond the professional clergy and into a much wider group of people.

Churches which welcome and nurture disciples, young and old, are more likely to grow. The message from both CGRP and HIRR is that people will grow in faith and stay with their churches and hence their churches will grow, if there is more on offer for them than Sunday alone. Perhaps home groups/nurture groups will be excellent places to explore some of the liberal creativity, flexibility and openness to the presence of the work of God in the world.

According to CGRP we need to be more than just being friendly and good with newcomers. Being intentional about the experience newcomers get when they come along, follow up, recent arrival gatherings, invitation to events, all these things really make a difference. If we can do more to make those who join us feel welcome and included, then there will be a big impact. Perhaps a peculiarly liberal insight on this is that we should expect our welcome process to include an element by which the newcomer, their talents/needs/identity will have some real impact on the rest of us, rather than their being simply being absorbed by the existing group.

Some of us will recognise many of these recommendations in much of what we already do. Can we do more?

Perhaps there will be room here for a prayer from the Society of St Francis:

Give to your church, O God, a bold vision and a daring charity, a refreshed wisdom and a courteous understanding, that the eternal wisdom of your Son may be acclaimed as the good news of the age; through him who makes all things new, even Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Water tap in the churchyard

People tending graves in the churchyard will have noticed that the tap near the new churchyard is no longer functioning and a new tap provides water where the path meets the drive. This is because when the work on the church toilets and kitchen was carried out, the old lead pipes had to be replaced with modern, safer ones.

If we had replaced the lead piping to the old tap, it would have cost almost £3000 pounds more – money we do not have to spare.

Old Mobiles For New Lives

Old unwanted mobile phones are needed now to raise funds to help save lives in Afghanistan.

Afghanistan is one of the worst places in the world for a women to give birth or for a child to be born, because of a shortage of midwives. Because of a lack of female education, not enough midwives are trained - and male doctors are not allowed to attend births.

This means that thousands of women and children die who might not otherwise if there were enough midwives in Afghanistan.

To raise funds to help, we recycle the old unwanted and even broken mobile phones that so many of us have lying around. The recycling company we use is also utilised by one of the largest international aid agencies.

If people can find that mobile at the back of a drawer gathering dust, it can make a big difference and help save lives - recycling is good for the planet too - and we know it's possible for one person to collect anything up to 17 old phones if they ask family & friends.

A local church ran an appeal for us too with a collecting bin which enabled us to send off over 90 old mobiles for recycling - and we need others to do the same also!

BRIDGE BUILDERS

Bridge Builders was set up in mid-2016 as a project of the Lichfield Christian Schools Work Trust. Its explicit purpose is to raise the understanding of the world of work for Years 10 to 13 students in the Lichfield area. This is achieved by the delivery of employability workshops and mock work interviews using the skills of adult volunteers.

The sessions provide students with a better understanding of what to expect in the workplace and how to prepare for an interview for college, university or work. Feedback from volunteers to students enhances their understanding and develops self-confidence and self-esteem.

Volunteers have found the sessions have dispelled media inspired myths about schools and have helped them to understand the different pressures young people face in comparison to their own school experiences.

Next steps

Dates have already been confirmed with 2 schools in the coming academic year and 4 new local schools have expressed interest in the programme. Provisionally, Bridge Builders can deliver about 10 sessions per year – the main facilitator is Rick Hill.

A wider base of volunteers from all backgrounds would enhance the current skills base – an experience of 'work' is the main criteria for volunteering. References are taken up for each volunteer.

Beauty and the Beast

Just to remind you, a cold hearted prince in a castle is turned into a Beast by an enchantress for his act of unkindness in refusing a rose in payment for lodging. The whole castle is put under a curse which will not be lifted until the Beast shows love for another and his love is returned. Many years pass and eventually a girl finds her way to the castle in search of her lost father, she is imprisoned by the Beast as he lets the father go. Eventually the bravery and kindness of the girl towards him wins him over and they discover their love for one another. The curse is lifted as the last petal on the rose falls with their kiss and they all live happily ever after.

In the film all the castle guests and servants are imaginatively turned into household objects and furniture. The castle and surrounding forest are turned into a snowy landscape, although it is summertime in the nearby town.





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
